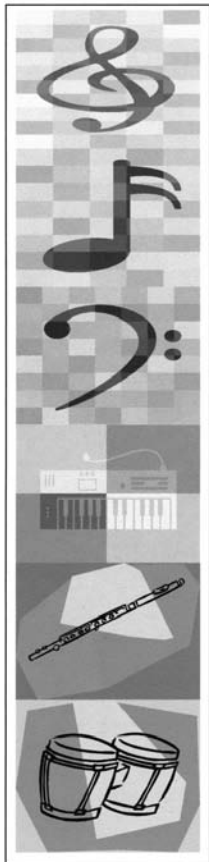

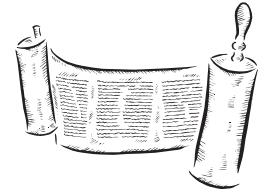

From the Rabbi

Chesed: Kindness

A Jewish Response to a Wounded World

Message from Rabbi Michael L. Feshbach

So I wanted to write about how we can hurt each other with words, when a far more physical kind of hurt unfolds before our eyes. How rapidly the world changes, as our attention shifted last month from Imus... to Virginia Tech.

I was with a group of several hundred Reform movement social justice activists, at the biennial Washington-based Consultation on Conscience when we first heard the news about this horrible tragedy in our midst. (The same day, I believe, several hundred people were killed in bombings in Baghdad. And who knows how many, every day, in Darfur.) There we were with Senators and Cabinet Ministers, preachers and politicians, gathered together to listen and learn, and work to make the world a better place... and then this news, and this feeling of spinning and uncertainty and this momentary pause, of helplessness and *deja vu*. And yes, it turns out, the killer even made a reference to Columbine in the tape he so cynically sent for all the world to see.

Right now, once again, our world is filled with questions, and reminders. How much the world can change, in the course of seconds. How much life can change forever through an accidental encounter. It may be the student who overslept and missed both class and an early appointment with eternity; it may be the car that crosses into the lane in which we were safely driving. It may be for bad and it may be for good (how, then, if you are married, did you meet your spouse?), but we carry on for days, for weeks, perhaps for years in a pre-planned and well-managed routine—and then our lives are forever altered in the course of seconds. The ordinary is punctuated by the unexpected, and we are never, ever the same.

Ironies. The Israeli Holocaust survivor, a hero through the lives of his students he saved—losing his own life... on *Yom HaShoah* (Holocaust Remembrance Day) itself. The phone calls and e-mails from Israel... asking if we are all right.

Already familiar themes are beginning to sound. One survivor notes that the key to healing, the most important thing, is to forgive the shooter. A good thing, a powerful thing if you can do it... for a victim who is still here to be able to do, and move on. But what about the victims who are no longer here? Where does forgiveness come from for them? And at least one answer, in our Jewish tradition, is a harsh one, and hard, perhaps, for those who are not Jewish to hear. The answer is: where does

forgiveness come from for murder? Folks... it doesn't. At least, not from us. Not in this world, and not in any way we can understand.

But the young student interviewed on CBS who was so ready to forgive did say something profoundly important as well, I thought. He said: "If I had only met him... if someone could have reached out... then none of this would have happened."

Who knows what might have been? Who knows how more outreach would have impacted the life of a sick and disturbed young man? For the signs were there, and there were those who tried to help. Hindsight is one thing; who knows in advance which angry loner will gently heal, and which one explode? But all we can do... is try. And do the best we can, reach out as best we can, be the best we can be.

Several years ago, the loners in Columbine were, it turned out, bullies who had been bullied. And one response emerged. If only it had lasted. If only we can remember it, more often, and make it part of the ordinary and routine in our lives.

The Hebrew word *chesed* is hard to translate, as it really probably means "someone who does something really nice for you that you could sort of expect based on your relationship with them but you could not demand in a court of law." Some have translated this as "covenant-love." Others just call it...kindness.

There are so many questions that I have about the world, and all the hurt and anger and pain that is in it. But this I know, and I know it for sure: that *chesed* is a good response. It is a good response, for it draws us closer to one another. And it is a good response, because sometimes—not always, not with scientific precision or certainty of success, but sometimes—sometimes it may actually work. Not only to draw those who have suffered a loss together, but also... to heal a wounded soul, to share a little love, to prevent someone, somewhere, from spinning into the abyss once again.

Chesed. Kindness. It's not a panacea. It's not a magic bullet (what a horrible phrase!) But it is a hope and a prayer, an opening of the heart, a chance for us all. A response... and a way of life.

To My Temple Shalom Family,

It hardly seems possible that it has been five years since Ruth, Gabe, Sarah and I said goodbye to you all as we set out on our journey to live for a year in Israel. We left in July of 2002 as very nervous first time visitors; nervous because of the *matzav* (the situation) and because we were leaving, at least we thought we were leaving, Temple Shalom. As we look back on it we can only smile at our naiveté, not only was the situation in Israel nowhere near as bad as the media would have you believe, but it was actually very safe and in some ways safer than it was here; but also naïve to think that we were ever really leaving our Temple Shalom community because in fact, you have been with us every step of the way.

There have been moments, as I have traveled the Northeast Amtrak corridor to New York, when I wondered if I could possibly continue this journey. Sometimes it was Ruth who picked me up, other times it was Gabe or Sarah and always, Temple Shalom was there in some way to say, you can do it and we will help. Whenever I wondered whether I was doing the right thing, I would walk into Temple Shalom and see the look on everyone's face and know that I was doing exactly what I was supposed to be doing.

I often think of the day back in the year 2000 or so when I was speaking with Julie Knoll and Steve Eisen. They asked me if I could commit to being on the Temple Shalom Executive Committee for the next four years. When I responded that I could not make that commitment, the look on Steve's face nearly broke my heart. Finally Julie blurted out: “You're going to rabbinical school aren't you?” Before I could answer (until that point only a few people knew), the sparkle returned to Steve's eyes, he smiled and grabbed me in a big bear hug and said that he and Temple Shalom were so proud of me. Well Steve, I hope you are still proud of me, because I have thought of that moment often and it always made me study harder and longer whenever I wondered if I had studied long and hard enough. My question was never whether I had studied enough for me, but whether I had studied enough to make Temple Shalom proud.

I have come to realize that there is no destination in life, except for the journey of life itself. The journey is what we make of it, the decisions, working around the obstacles in the best way we can and, how we treat those placed in our lives along the way. We can choose to treat people with contempt and we can be arrogant. Or, we can see the spark of the divine that exists in each one of us and treat each other with the respect and dignity that each of us deserves. I know from my years at Temple Shalom that there is only one decision that each of us can possibly make.

After five years, this leg of the journey is ending and the next is beginning. I will be the Rabbi at Congregation Kol Ami of Frederick for the coming year and hopefully, many more. Kol Ami is a wonderful community that has embraced Ruth, Gabe, Sarah and me and has made us part of their family too. Kol Ami also understands that there is only one decision that each of us can make regarding how we treat each other. But this doesn't mean that we will leave Temple Shalom, Sarah will have her Bat Mitzvah here and we will continue to be a part of as many things as possible.

It wasn't easy all those years ago to leave our community to spend a year in a faraway country; however, we did so and learned a great lesson. You never actually leave your community, you may be away for awhile but you are still a part of it. No matter what the future holds for us, we know that we will always be part of this wonderful community. I will always thank God for Temple Shalom.
